Dear Minister

I am writing to congratulate you on your recent appointment as Minister of Health and to introduce you to the Blood Cancer Alliance (BCA) and to request a briefing meeting to inform you about our work.

To inform you, the BCA is a group of fourteen charities representing people with blood cancer across the United Kingdom. It was formed to provide a strong, unified voice to tackle the issues blood cancer patients and their families face, and to improve the experience and outcomes of all those living with one of the 100+types of the disease.

Blood cancer is the fifth most common type of adult cancer, the most common cancer amongst children and the third biggest cancer killer, and claims more lives every year than breast or prostate cancer. However this type of cancer is often poorly understood relative to the 'big four'. Unlike solid tumour cancers, blood cancers are often not treatable using surgery or radiotherapy. According to the latest Cancer Treatment facts and figures only 11% and 12% of blood cancer patients respectively were treated through radiotherapy and surgery compared to 55% of breast cancer patients treated through radiotherapy and 77% through surgery.

As you may be aware following the publication of recent research by the Centre for Public Health at the Queen's University Belfast, in Northern Ireland there were 782 patients diagnosed annually with blood and lymph cancer between 2013 and 2017. Diagnosing some types of blood cancer is often complex as symptoms, such as back pain or tiredness, are often misunderstood or misdiagnosed. This lack of awareness and understanding often has a direct impact on patients and is a significant challenge to overcome as later diagnosis is generally linked with poorer survival outcomes. This is showcased in the latest figures which highlight the three year net survival rate was at its lowest when patients were diagnosed via the Emergency Presentation Route-to-Diagnosis rather than when the cancer is diagnosed at an earlier stage.

The BCA welcomes the latest developments on the new Cancer Strategy for Northern Ireland and is keen to investigate how we can work together to ensure the strategy supports blood cancer patients. Specifically, within the strategy the BCA is calling for the diagnosis gap to be closed.
